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Yemen's path forward – assessing the country's fragmentation crisis



Months following the Saudi-Houthi peace talks, any real progress towards Yemeni interests is yet to be seen.

Yemen has suffered an eight-year civil war, often described as a proxy war, due to the involvement of external powers, namely Saudi Arabia, the UAE – and in opposition, Iran. The conflict led to one of the worst humanitarian crises of our century, affecting approximately 80 per cent of the nation. However, the country's intensified fragmentation has been the most troubling and arguably the most detrimental outcome. The war had exacerbated and redefined the nation's existing political, social, and religious divisions – and created new ones within the broader Houthi-controlled North and the

South, which the internationally recognised

Yemeni government officially controls. Today, this fragmentation continues to threaten the country's unity. This presentation will explore the nation's complex historical, social, security and political dynamics to interpret the impact of this fragmentation-considering the path forward for Yemen and its people.
